In partnership with SIU Offices of Antiracism, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion:

The purpose of the Leading for Antiracism, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Leadership Certificate is to actively engage students to deepen their knowledge and understanding of diverse perspectives, histories, and voices. Participants will learn how patterns of perception, logic, thought, speech, behavior, and organizational structures influence racial equity in America and globally. Students who complete this certificate will enhance their capacity to lead and work towards advancing antiracism, diversity, equity, and inclusion in their classrooms, communities, and workplace.

Co-Curricular Criteria: Students will participate in a minimum of five events (per year) during their academic tenure. Successful completion of Certificate requires 30 total clock hours of engagement and professional development. The Certificate consists of five modules, with each topic representing one hour. Self-paced trainings and assessments may be completed at any time prior to graduation. Students will need to show proof of assessment results and training completion to receive clock hour credit.

# **Diversity Podcasts:**

## 1. The Will to Change: Uncovering True Stories of Diversity and Inclusion

This podcast is hosted by Jennifer Brown, an entrepreneur, speaker, author and diversity and inclusion expert. Brown interviews CEO's, bestselling authors, and entrepreneurs to discuss diversity and inclusion in their work and how diversity drives innovation and business results

## 2. Code Switch

NPR's Code Switch takes on subjects such as intersectionality and how experiences of diverse groups of people play out in everyday life, including in the workplace. Hosted by journalists of color, the podcast "tackles the subject of race head-on" and explores "how it impacts every part of society.

# 3. Latinos Who Lunch

FavyFav, an artist, and Babelito, an art historian, host Latinos Who Lunch, a podcast that dives deep into the issue of intersectionality. They intermix conversations about food, wealth, body positivity, and cultural appropriation.

#### 4. Women at Work

Harvard Business Review (HBR)'s Women at Work was created by duo Amy Bernstein, HBR editor, and Amy Gallo, author of the HBR Guide to Dealing with Conflict and a contributing editor for the publication. Now in its fifth season, the podcast covers issues related to women in workplace.

#### 5. The Future of Work

The Future of Work is a weekly podcast hosted by Jacob Morgan. Each episode is an in-depth interview with both U.S. and international senior executives and business leaders about working in and running a business with current events in mind.

## 6. The Diversity Gap

The Diversity Gap takes a hard look at the difference between having good intentions and have good impact. Host Bethaney Wilkinson interviews a broad range of people, from business leaders to authors, who offer insights on how they perceive diversity gaps in their world and offer solutions for filling those gaps.

# 7. Making Gay History

In order to get where we're going, we need to take a hard look about how we got here. Making Gay History is an oral history of key figures from the LGBTQ+ movement from 1945-1990. The podcast mines author and historian Eric Marcus's decades-old audio archive of rare interviews to create intimate, personal portraits of both known and long-forgotten champions, heroes, and witnesses to history.

## 8. Race at Work

Host Porter Braswell wants to create a safe space to talk about how race can affect work experiences and outcomes. On the podcast, produced by the *Harvard Business Review*, leaders share their personal career journeys and talk about how race, equity and inclusion has influenced their paths.

### 9. Disability Matters

Host Joyce Bender has been on a mission to employ and empower people with disabilities since 2004. With over 700 episodes, the disability employment consultant talks with experts about recruitment, mentoring and accessibility in the workplace.

# 10. Asian Enough

In this podcast that explores being Asian American, hosts Jen Yamato, Johana Bhuiyan, Tracy Brown, and Suhauna Hussain of the *Los Angeles Times* invite guests to share personal stories and unpack identity on their own terms. They explore the vast diaspora across cultures, backgrounds, and generations, and try to expand the ways in which being Asian American is defined.
