Market Update

SUMMARY

- The second quarter of 2026 began with heightened concerns surrounding the conflict in the Middle East, rising energy prices, and inflationary consequences of supply disruptions. As the quarter progressed, easing geopolitical tensions and a pullback in oil prices improved investor sentiment, allowing markets to refocus on economic fundamentals and monetary policy.
- The quarter marked a significant transition at the Federal Reserve (Fed). The Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) held its target range unchanged at 3.50% to 3.75% at Kevin Warsh's first meeting as Fed Chair. As expected, the Fed removed all forward guidance, signaling a more data-dependent approach. The June "dot plot" also shifted more hawkish, with nine policymakers projecting at least one rate hike in 2026. Given current market pricing, we see value in the front-end of the yield curve.

ECONOMIC SNAPSHOT

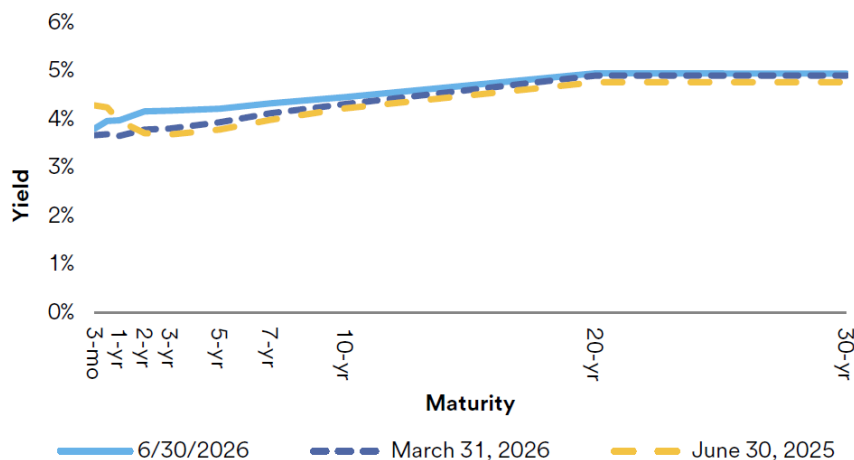
- Labor market conditions normalized as payroll growth slowed and wage gains moderated, particularly among lower-income households. Despite this cooling, job openings remained elevated and layoffs historically low, reinforcing a "low-hire, low-fire" environment. While conditions are softening, we view the labor market as normalizing rather than deteriorating.
- Economic growth remained supported by business investment, while consumer spending made its weakest contribution to gross domestic product (GDP) in several years. Declining savings rates and slowing wage gains suggest continued moderation in consumption. Technology, software, and AI-related capital expenditures continue to support business activity and productivity expectations. At the same time, strong demand for computing infrastructure has contributed to inflationary pressures in select technology segments. We expect economic growth to remain near current trends, with business investment offsetting signs of moderating consumer demand.
- Inflation remained above the Fed's target throughout the quarter with headline inflation accelerating, driven primarily by higher energy prices. Core measures remained elevated as services inflation showed limited signs of improvement. Importantly, long-run inflation expectations stayed relatively well anchored despite higher headline readings. We believe headline inflation may be at or near its peak as energy prices retreat, but persistently elevated core inflation remains a concern for the Fed as it determines the near-term path of policy rates.

Market Update

INTEREST RATES

- U.S. Treasury yields rose across the curve during the second quarter as markets repriced the Fed's policy path amid energy-driven inflation concerns and a more hawkish outlook. The move was led by shorter maturities, particularly the 2-year Treasury, as markets reduced expectations for policy easing and increased the probability of additional rate hikes.
- The 3-month U.S. Treasury ended the quarter at 3.81%, 14 bps higher. The 2-, 5-, and 10-year U.S. Treasuries ended the quarter at 4.17%, 4.23%, and 4.47%, representing increases of +38 bps, +28 bps, and +15 bps, respectively.
- Bond indices delivered mixed performance during the quarter as rising yields weighed on valuations, while elevated income supported returns. The ICE BofA 3-month and 2-year U.S. Treasury indices returned 0.88% and 0.27%, respectively. The 5-year U.S. Treasury index declined 0.17%, while the 10-year returned 0.13%, as higher income in longer maturities helped offset valuation headwinds.

SECTOR PERFORMANCE

- Excess returns were generally positive during the quarter as improving sentiment surrounding Middle East negotiations supported spread products. Despite robust issuance volumes, corporate bonds were the strongest performing sector, outperforming both asset-backed and mortgage-backed securities.
- Federal agency and supranational issuance remained limited throughout the quarter, helping keep spreads near historically tight levels. Limited supply is likely to constrain excess return opportunities going forward.
- Investment-grade corporate bonds benefited from strong investor demand and healthy corporate fundamentals. Credit spreads tightened toward historically rich valuations, supporting excess returns during Q2. While fundamentals remain favorable, limited spread compression remains. We expect income generation and carry to be the primary contributors to returns going forward.
- Agency-backed mortgage-backed securities generated positive excess returns as demand remained strong and interest-rate volatility moderated. Agency CMBS also performed well, benefiting from favorable technical conditions. Despite recent performance, we continue to view valuations as rich relative to historical levels which may limit future excess return opportunities.
- Given our expectation that the Fed will remain on hold into 2027, we continue to view all-in yields as attractive across fixed income sectors. However, with valuations historically rich, we expect income generation, carry, and security selection drive returns.

Investment Approach

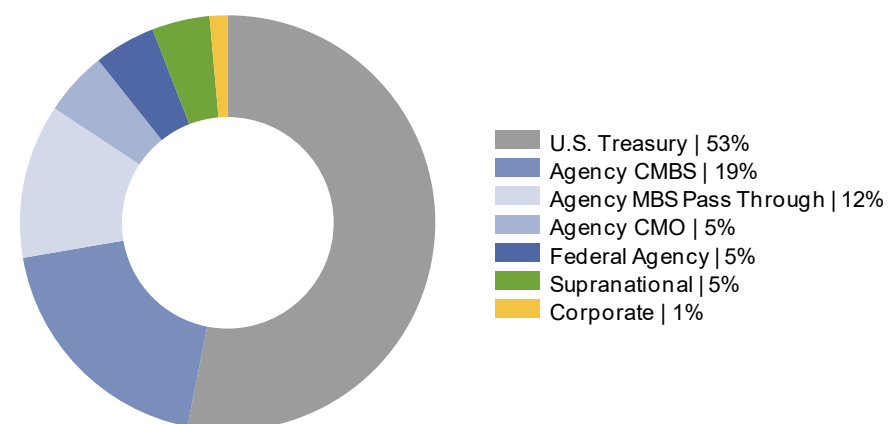
- The University's Intermediate Term portfolio is actively managed by PFM Asset Management. PFMAM seeks to add value by strategically buying or selling high-quality, fixed-income securities. Funds in the core portfolio are typically not needed over an intermediate- or long- term horizon and are therefore invested in fixed-income securities with maturity dates up to 10 years. This actively managed portfolio generally consists of all securities types available to the University in accordance with the permitted investments as described in the Illinois Public Funds Investment Act and the University's Investment Policy and Guidelines.

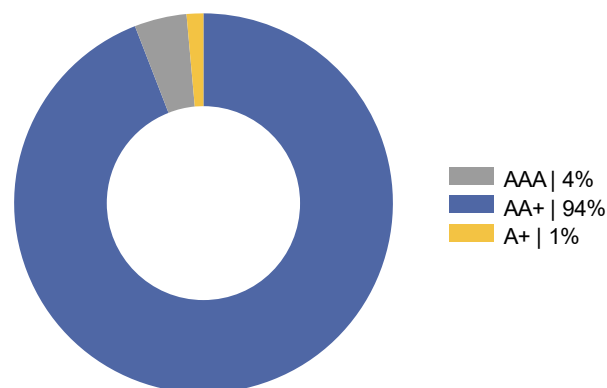

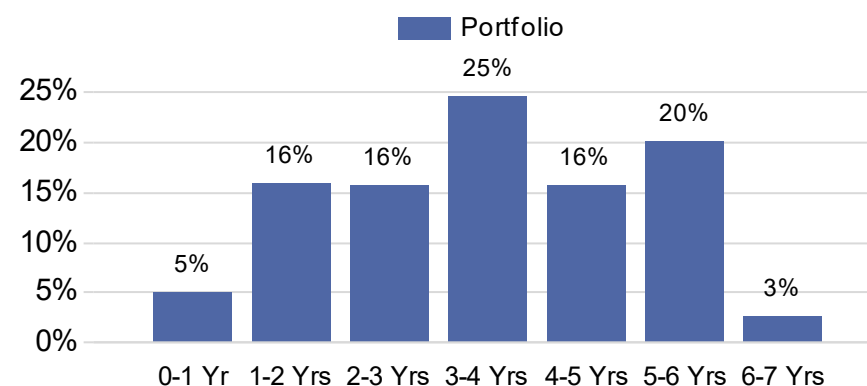
Sector Allocation

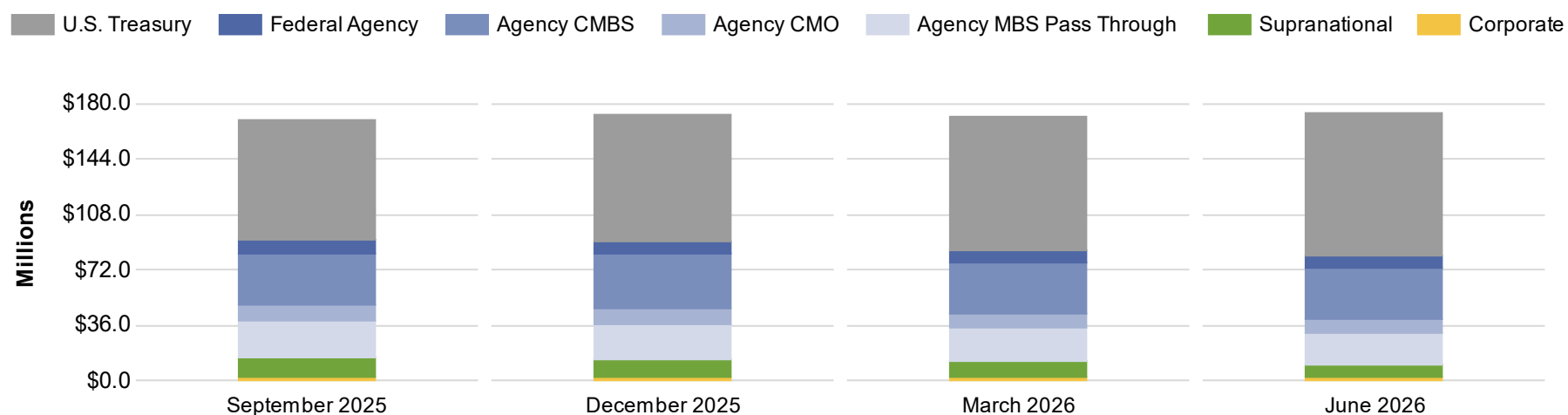

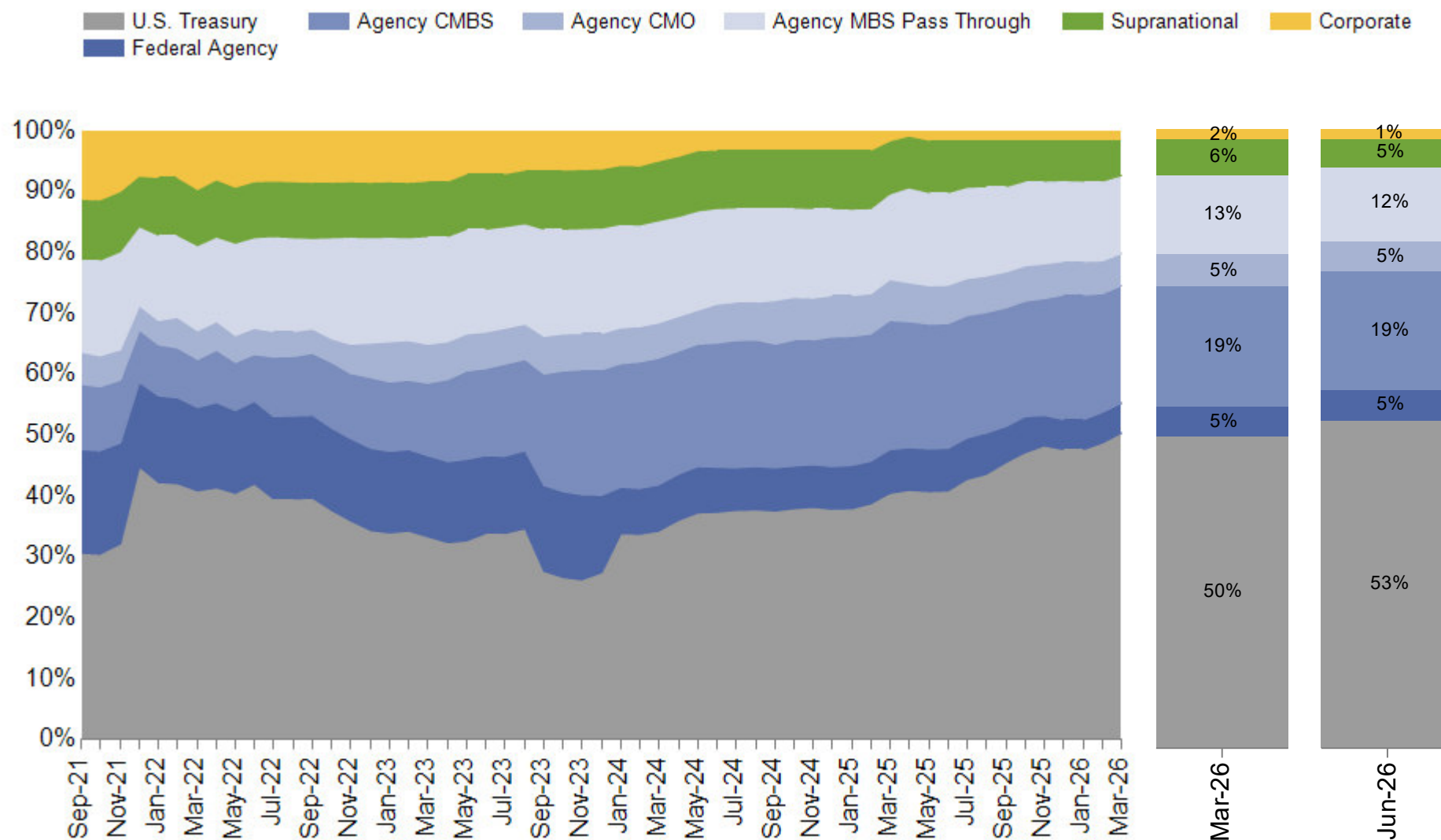

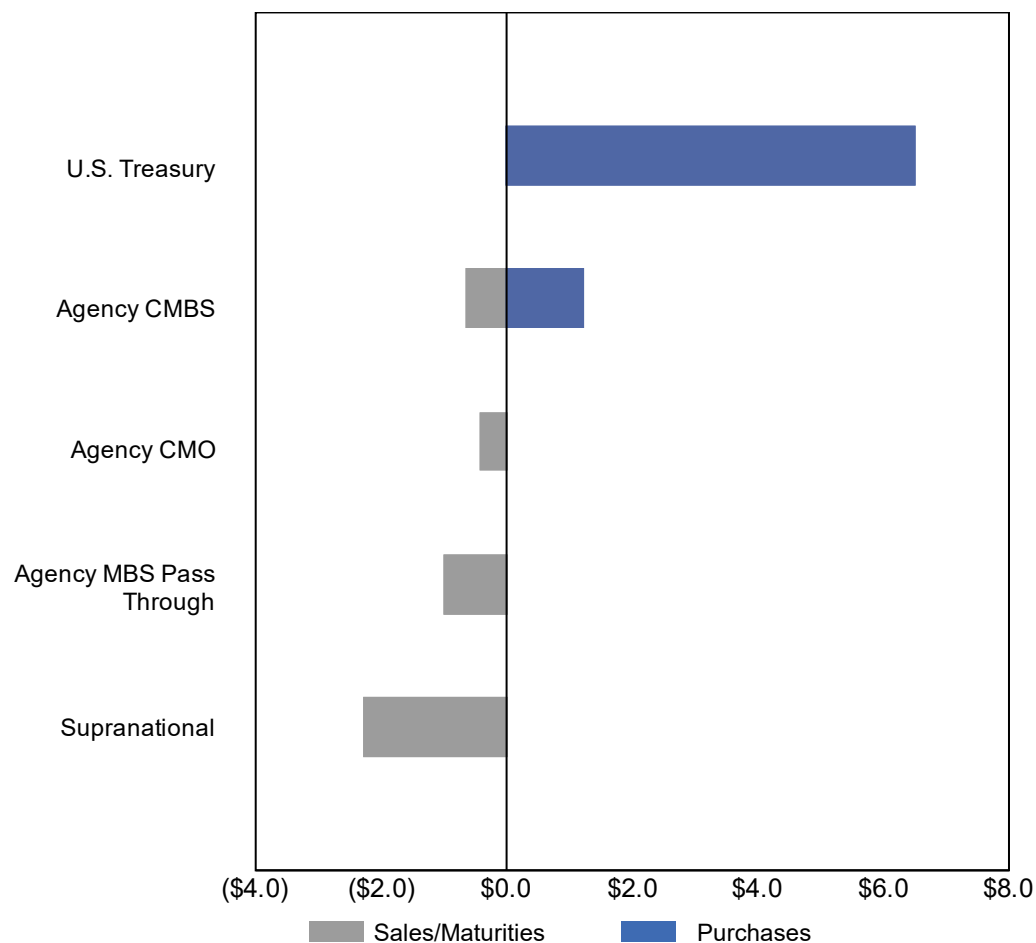
Historical Sector Allocation - SIU- INTERMEDIATE TERM

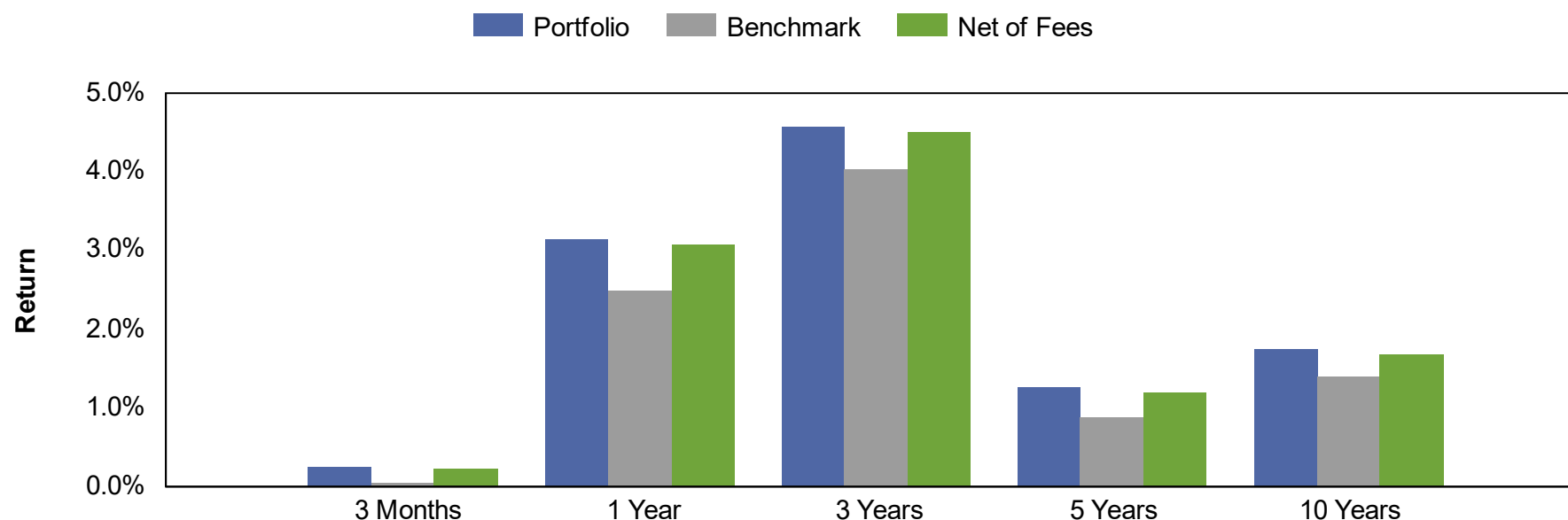
Net Activity by Sector

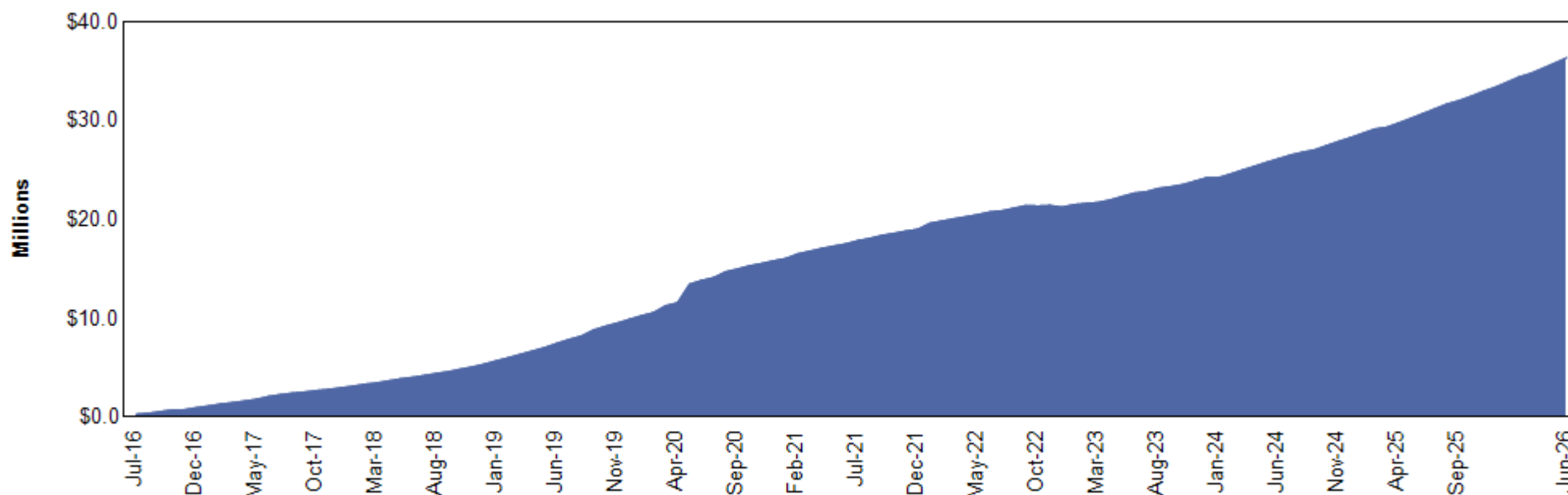

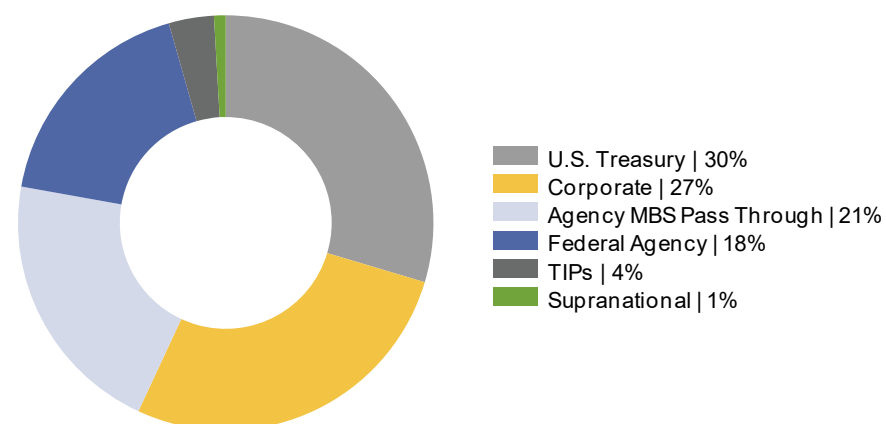

LMC seeks to add value by strategically buying or selling high-quality, fixed-income securities. Funds in the core portfolio are typically not needed over an intermediate- or long- term horizon and are therefore invested in fixed-income securities with maturity dates up to 10 years. This actively managed portfolio generally consists of all securities types available to the University in accordance with the permitted investments as described in the Illinois Public Funds Investment Act and the University's Investment Policy and Guidelines.

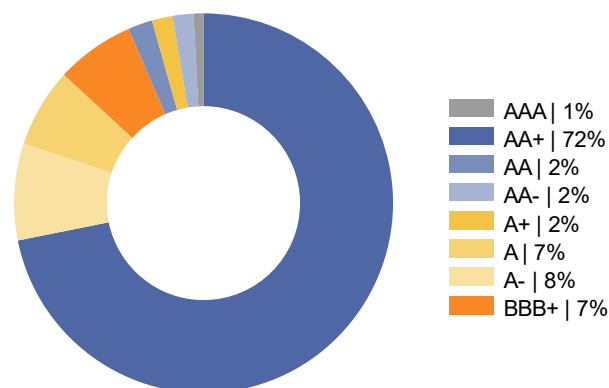

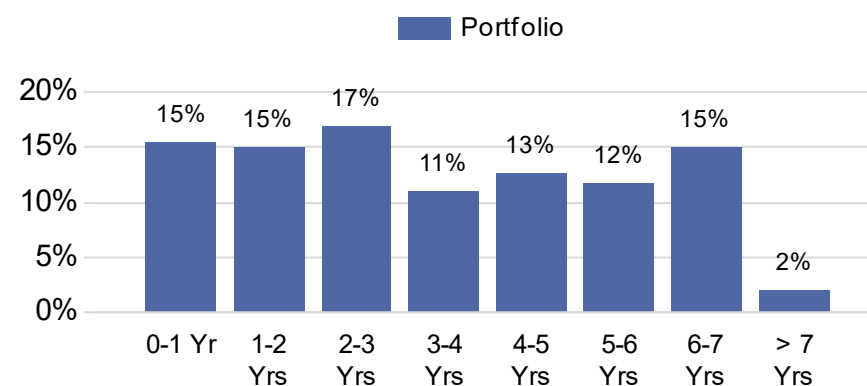
Sector Allocation

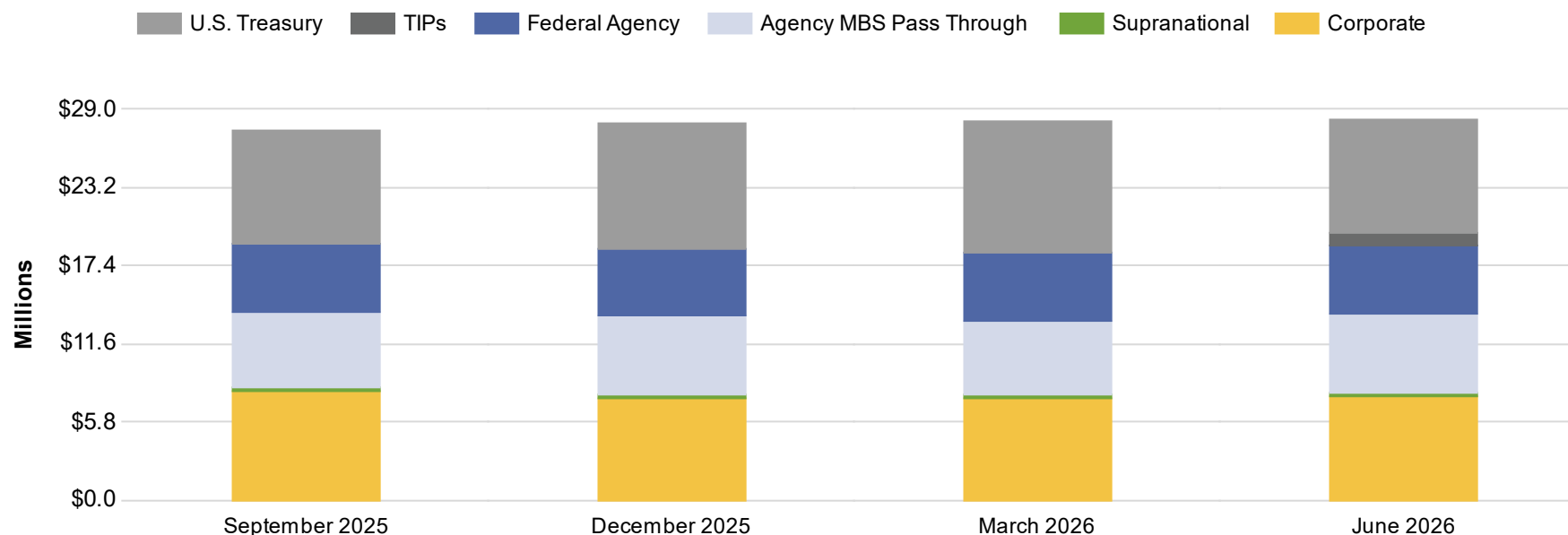

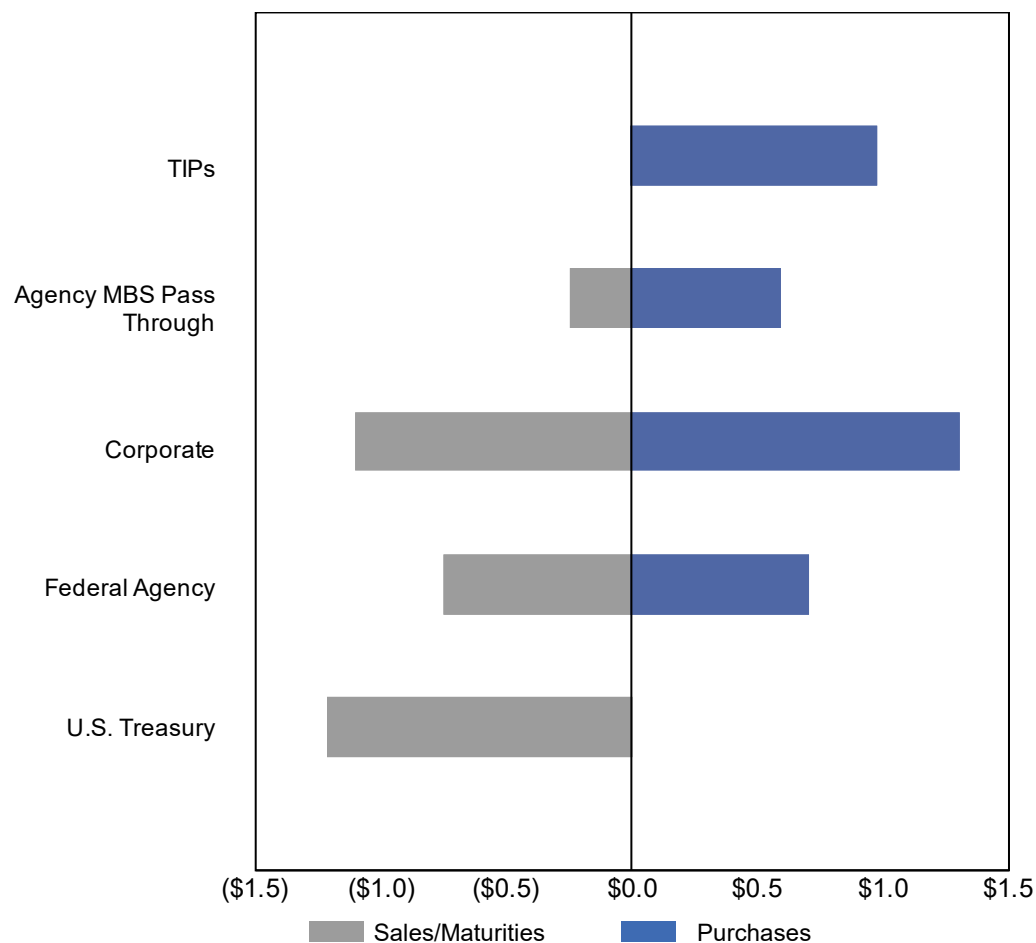

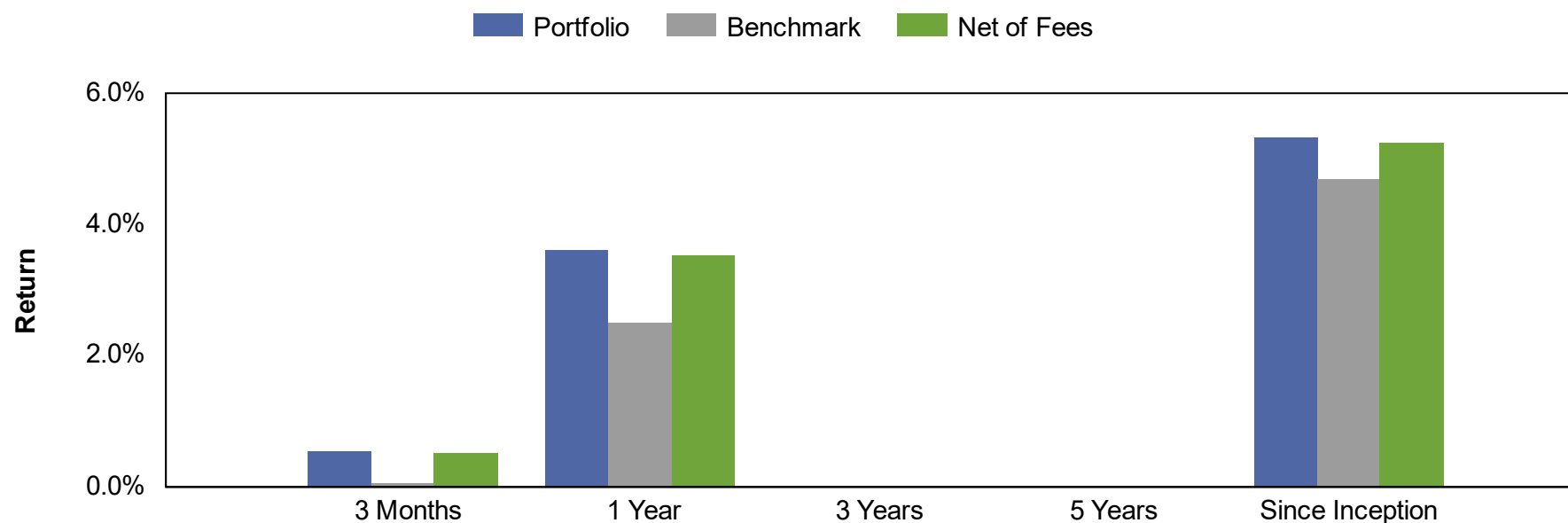
Net Activity by Sector (\$ millions)

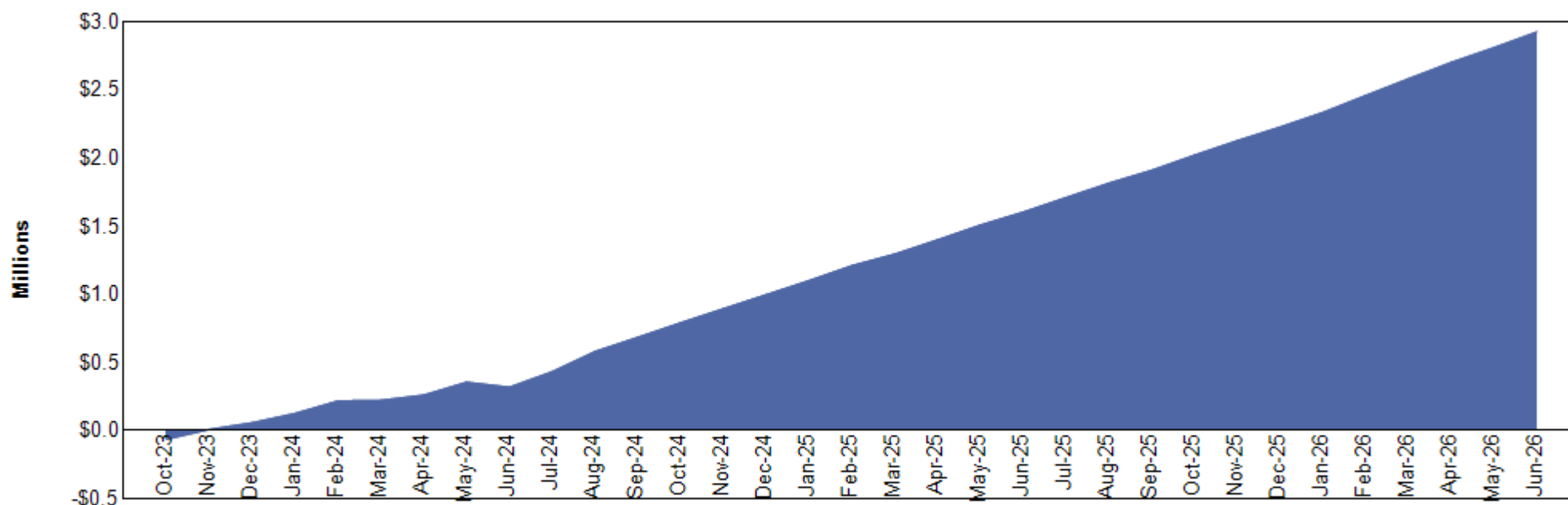

SIU - Short Term Portfolio

Investment Approach

- The University's Short-Term portfolio is actively managed by PFM Asset Management. The short-term portfolio is structured to match the University's anticipated liquidity needs. The portfolio's duration typically ranges from 0 – 12 months, but is limited to a maximum maturity of 3 years. These funds are designed to be used for specific, predictable cash flows (i.e. payroll, debt service) as well as a liquidity cushion of cash available for any unforeseen expenses. Typical investments include, short-term U.S. Treasuries, short-term Federal Agencies, and commercial paper. Permitted investments are limited to those as described in the Illinois Public Funds Investment Act and the University's Investment Policy and Guidelines. The University's Short-Term portfolio did not hold any securities as of June 30, 2026.

Investment Approach

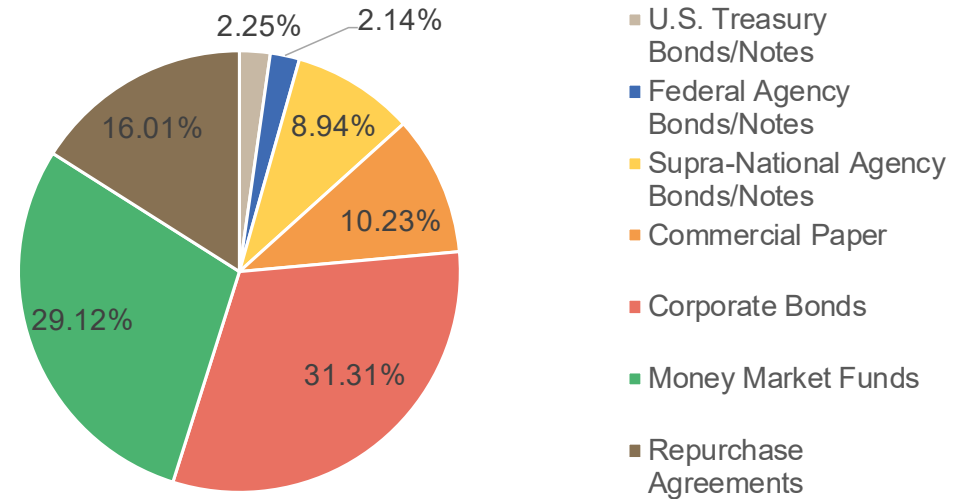
- The Illinois Funds is a Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP) operated by the Illinois State Treasurer's Office. The Illinois Funds strives to provide an inexpensive investment vehicle that features safety, daily liquidity and yield for Illinois public funds programs. The fund is managed by the Office of the State Treasurer in Springfield, Illinois, and contained a combined \$17.8 billion in total assets as of June 30, 2026. The fund is currently rated AAmmf by Fitch.

Investment Approach

- The U.S. Bank First American Funds Treasury Obligations Money Market Fund (MMF) sweep is utilized for purposes of investing daily operating liquidity funds. The Treasury Obligations MMF purchases U.S. Treasury securities and repurchase agreements collateralized by such obligations. The fund carries a AAAM rating by Standard & Poor's and a Aaa-mf rating by Moody's.

Capital Investments

Investment Approach

- PFM Asset Management actively manages the Interest Sinking Fund accounts. The Interest Sinking Fund accounts are managed to follow a cash flow driven strategy that is based on the University's debt service collection schedule and bondholder payment dates.
- PFM Asset Management actively manages the Debt Service Reserve Fund. The Debt Service Reserve Fund is generally managed to a duration of between 1 and 3 years depending on prevailing market conditions. Breakeven and sensitivity analyses are used to determine duration targets in an attempt to minimize downside and replenishment risk.
- Construction proceeds are invested in accordance with the anticipated drawdown schedule of the project(s) being financed and in accordance with debt financing documents.

Glossary

- **Accrued Interest:** Interest that is due on a bond or other fixed income security since the last interest payment was made.
- **Agencies:** Federal agency securities and/or Government-sponsored enterprises.
- **Amortized Cost:** The original cost of the principal of the security is adjusted for the amount of the periodic reduction of any discount or premium from the purchase date until the date of the report. Discount or premium with respect to short-term securities (those with less than one year to maturity at time of issuance) is amortized on a straight line basis. Such discount or premium with respect to longer-term securities is amortized using the constant yield basis.
- **Asset-Backed Security:** A financial instrument collateralized by an underlying pool of assets – usually ones that generate a cash flow from debt, such as loans, leases, credit card balances, and receivables.
- **Bankers' Acceptance:** A draft or bill of exchange accepted by a bank or trust company. The accepting institution guarantees payment of the bill as well as the insurer.
- **Commercial Paper:** An unsecured obligation issued by a corporation or bank to finance its short-term credit needs, such as accounts receivable and inventory.
- **Contribution to Total Return:** The weight of each individual security multiplied by its return, then summed for each sector to determine how much each sector added or subtracted from the overall portfolio performance.
- **Effective Duration:** A measure of the sensitivity of a security's price to a change in interest rates, stated in years.
- **Effective Yield:** The total yield an investor receives in relation to the nominal yield or coupon of a bond. Effective yield takes into account the power of compounding on investment returns, while nominal yield does not.
- **FDIC:** Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. A federal agency that insures bank deposits to a specified amount.
- **Interest Rate:** Interest per year divided by principal amount and expressed as a percentage.
- **Market Value:** The value that would be received or paid for an investment in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date.
- **Maturity:** The date upon which the principal or stated value of an investment becomes due and payable.
- **Negotiable Certificates of Deposit:** A CD with a very large denomination, usually \$1 million or more, that can be traded in secondary markets.
- **Par Value:** The nominal dollar face amount of a security.
- **Pass-through Security:** A security representing pooled debt obligations that passes income from debtors to its shareholders. The most common type is the mortgage-backed security.

Glossary

- Repurchase Agreements: A holder of securities sells these securities to an investor with an agreement to repurchase them at a fixed price on a fixed date.
- Settle Date: The date on which the transaction is settled and monies/securities are exchanged. If the settle date of the transaction (i.e., coupon payments and maturity proceeds) occurs on a non-business day, the funds are exchanged on the next business day.
- Supranational: A multinational union or association in which member countries cede authority and sovereignty on at least some internal matters to the group, whose decisions are binding on its members.
- Trade Date: The date on which the transaction occurred; however, the final consummation of the security transaction and payment has not yet taken place.
- Unsettled Trade: A trade which has been executed; however, the final consummation of the security transaction and payment has not yet taken place.
- U.S. Treasury: The department of the U.S. government that issues Treasury securities.
- Yield: The rate of return based on the current market value, the annual interest receipts, maturity value, and the time period remaining until maturity, stated as a percentage on an annualized basis.
- YTM at Cost: The yield to maturity at cost is the expected rate of return based on the original cost, the annual interest receipts, maturity value, and the time period from purchase date to maturity, stated as a percentage on an annualized basis.
- YTM at Market: The yield to maturity at market is the rate of return based on the current market value, the annual interest receipts, maturity value, and the time period remaining until maturity, stated as a percentage on an annualized basis.
